14. If God is willing to judge those who have received Jesus and so "become children of God" (Jn 1.12) what does Peter say in these verses about those "disobey the gospel" and are therefore "not children of God" but "children of the flesh" (Rom 9.8)? Which would you rather endure, the fiery trials now, knowing you will be saved, or the final judgement to come?

15. How do we see once again that suffering is not outside the will and purposes of God? Does knowing these things make it easier or harder to entrust our souls to a faithful creator?

Notice how at the end of this passage that Peter slips in another encouragement to do good - our proper response to God's grace, even though we endure fiery trials.

Pray

Pray for those to preach and teach in your church, for the wonderful task of explaining the gospel of Christ, and the, often difficult task, or teaching that as believers we should not be surprised by suffering or persecution

Once again pray for "your brotherhood throughout the world" (1 Pt 5.9) who are suffering through fiery trials at this time.
